Texans celebrate 150 years of individuality

The seniors of '86 not only have the memory of the appearance of Haley's Comet on the year they celebrated, they also have the memory of Texas celebrating its 150th Birthday.

The whole state of Texas joined in celebrating Texas' Sesquicentennial, with such events as Austin's fireworks show and Houston's laser building show.

Another way a group of proud Texans celebrated the 150th birthday of Texas was by taking a 6 month caravan of over 100 covered wagons from South Texas to El Paso and ending up in Fort Worth.

The wagon train rolled through Blanco on March 4. Over 1000 people gathered on Main Street to witness this once in a lifetime event.

Blanco Elementary really took part in celebrating Texas' Sesquicentennial. From grades K-8, the students took part in all kinds of projects such as drawing pictures and writing stories. Some of the students constructed their own covered wagons, which were displayed in the merchants' windows downtown. Six of these wagons were selected to be put on display at SWTSU.

Not only were the students involved in the elementary Sesquicentennial tribute, but parent volunteers also joined in the celebration. A six-week Sesquicentennial workshop was organized by Mary Kay Nunshbaum. Mrs. Nunshbaum would hold her workshop one day each week for grades 1 thru 3.

San Jacinto day has always been a neglected holiday. This April 21 took on special meaning because schools all over Texas took a holiday as did most banks and state government offices. The way to impress the importance of the defeat of Santa Anna's Mexican army, which gave us our independence from Mexico, is to give Texas a holiday.

The sadness of the space shuttle (Challenger), the shock of the terrorist's attacks and the fear of Russia's melt down have plagued Texans in 1986. Texans did not let these events disturb the celebration of Texas being 150 years old.



Board cares about quality of education

School board members are special people. They are members of our district who care about the quality of education of the student and want to have a hand in moving forward to improve the system.

Membership on the board requires election by the voters for a job with no pay. Another stipulation from House Bill 72 and set forth by the state board of education requires that by January, 1987 all board members must have 20 hours of training as a part of the district's accreditation. After the initial 20 hours of training, 6 additional hours must be attained each year. This makes a person who decides to run for school board think hard about the position they might be assuming.

Given the factors presented, our district is continually endeavoring to maintain an education program that will help each individual student to develop personal knowledge, skills, and competence to maximum capacity, and to learn behavior patterns which will make each student a responsible member of society.

In terms of the board's rationale, they want each individual student to achieve intellectual discipline, economic and occupational competence, citizenship and political understanding, physical and environmental health, cultural appreciation and aesthetics, personal and social relations, and learning to use leisure time properly.

Our board tries to provide the place for this education to prevail and the personnel to do the job. With the help of the school administration, they are striving to meet these goals.

Some of the major decisions they have made this year to achieve their goals have been the implementation of a pre-kindergarten program, air conditioning in high school to improve the learning atmosphere, a new telephone system to improve communication between schools and the central office, a fenced-in bus area to help curb vandalism, and finishing the track around the football field for a more all-around sports program.

High School Faculty adjusts to state mandated guidelines

With a goal of statewide improvement of the educational system, the Texas Legislature passed two major reform bills, House Bills 246 and 72.

House Bill 246 created chapter 75 of the Texas Education Code which created minimum time requirements, new graduation requirements, and essential element requirements for each course or subject. House Bill 72 mandated some sweeping reforms, including no pass/no play and teacher career ladder.

The career ladder was established to reward master teachers who meet certain qualifications. Although many of our teachers meet the qualifications, funding from the state has provided for financial rewards to only a portion of the teachers. Selections of career ladder teachers is based upon classroom performance as evaluated by the administrators. At least four visits are made by the appropriate principal and the administrative assistant. The highest rating is 5 and the lowest is a 1. To remain on the career ladder, a teacher must have 5.1% 4's (exceed expectations) and no 2's (needs improvement) on each year's summative appraisal.

Implementation of the essential elements on the high school level was required this year. The teachers met these minimum requirements for each course taught. Gradebooks have to correlate each essential element to the grade earned, and lesson plans have to be coded with the element covered. If a teacher was doing his job well before HB 72, he was already covering the essential elements and just had to inject the number for the element covered.

For all students, but especially for a student who does not master 70% of the essential elements taught in class, tutoring sessions are offered before school.

For all teachers and administrators a competency test—Texas Examination of Current Administrators and Teachers (TECAT) is scheduled March 10. TECAT will test all teachers on reading ability, writing ability, and knowledge of certain vocabulary words. Teachers took the test in Blanco I.S.D. Cafeteria.



Faculty meetings improve instructional skills

At faculty meetings held before and after school, Superintendent Larry Moehle presents ways in which instruction could be improved. Topics covered were effective teaching, teaching for retention, teaching for transfer, teaching thinking, increasing motivation, and the reinforcement theory. Through group study and participation, the administration and staff are improving their skills so that a student leaving Blanco I.S.D. will be truly educated, motivated, and a better citizen.

From the people in Concord came the statement, "She stood for what was best in us at a time when we wanted to believe that the American spirit was reborn. That makes her death hard."

Shuttle Commander Francis Scobee, Pilot Michael Smith, Judith Resnik, Ronald McNair, Ellison Onizuka, Gregory Jarvis, and Christa McAuliffe are real modern day heroes and heroines. They gave us all a lesson in uncommon valor.

Three lettermen return

The 1985-86 Basketball season could be described as good, even though it fell short of previous years. For the 1st time in 5 years, the Panthers failed to make the playoffs. Nevertheless, the Panther season had to be considered good due to the lack of experience and overall youth of the team.

There were only three returning lettermen from the super squad of '85 that went to regional finals before losing to Temple Academy. Two of these three were Seniors while the rest of the squad were underclassmen who had been on the JV. last year. The two Seniors were Daryl Friedrich and Randall Handberry, and these two were Captains as well as the leading scorers and rebounders for the year. The other returning letterman was Duak Hunter who was hurt in early season and didn't get into playing form until district rolled around.

The Panthers played well early in the year as they had a 16-6 non-district record with many wins over larger schools. Included in this was a 1st place at the Johnson City tournament and a 2nd place at the Marble Falls tournament. Entering district play the Panthers were picked 3rd behind Dripping Springs and Comfort. The team opened with a win at Johnson City but fell to Dripping Springs and In-

gram in the 1st round. The 2nd round of play, the Panthers fell to Johnson City but rebounded to score a big win at Ingram in one of their best performances. The Panthers again fell in Dripping Springs after playing a great first half to finish district play with a 6-6 record. This left the Panthers a game out of the playoffs as they finished 3rd behind Dripping Springs and Ingram.

Despite the failure to make the playoffs, the team reached the 20 game plateau as they had a season record of 21 wins and 10 losses. In addition, the 21 wins gave the Panthers 120 total wins in the 5 years under Coach Berry Beasley.

Daryl Friedrich and Randall Handberry made first team all-district with Duak Hunter and Kelly Sanders selected as honorable mention choices. 

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

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
