Missing first place by one point to Junction at the district meet, the literary team proved that they could "come back strong" from last year's showing. The team amassed 164 points from three 1st's, four 2nd's, one 3rd, four 4th's, two 5th's, and two 6th places. This was the first year that points were given for 4th through 6th place. Sixteen students prepared themselves for the district meet by attending a practice meet in Bandera. Likewise, six students went to Ingram for an invitational speech meet. Most of the students who attended these preparatory meets placed well in district. The district meet began on March 27 in Junction with the Journalism, Ready Writing, and Debating events. The next day the other events were held in Johnson City. Thirty-five Blanco students competed on these two days. Seven students won 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place in the district meet and went to Victoria on April 24-25 for the regional competition, where they represented the school well.

School Board understands problems from voters' and state's side and works for solutions

Our school board members take the responsibility to assure quality education for the students and to use the tax dollar wisely for the people in the school district.

Because the board knew that new facilities would be needed to meet state requirements for House Bill 72, they appointed a committee of 15 voters to review the school and make recommendations back to them. The committee recommended a new high school.

After the committee report, the school board took action and bought over 20 acres on Rocky Road on the west side of the city.

In October, 1986, the Texas Education Agency Division of Accreditation made a monitoring visit to the school. During their observation, they said that the school met acceptable conditions in all areas except physical facilities. They said that facilities were an area of concern.

On October 25, 1986, a bond

proposal was voted upon for the new \$2,965 million high school. The bond failed 598 to 344.

After the bond failed, the board got input from the people on their wishes. Consolidation with Johnson City was considered, and a facilities study and master plan was presented to interested voters on Monday nights before another bond proposal.

The board also changed plans on the proposed high school considering entrance to the facility.

In April, James Klepac and James Latham were reelected to the board with no opposition.

On May 23, another bond proposal was held and it failed 542 to 435.

Among many other actions by the board was the awarding of service pins to personnel of the district. 3, 5, 10, 15, 20, and 25 year pins were given to personnel at a meeting on May 26.

In his second year, Superintendent Moehnke faces challenges and strives to meet state mandates

On the school tractor, Superintendent Moehnke and school board members mowed the 20 acres purchased by the district for the proposed new high school. The land is located on Rocky Road on the west side of the city limits.

Alleviating overcrowding at all levels, giving classrooms at the high school level that will improve instructional programs, and meeting state requirements is the challenge that Superintendent Larry Moehnke has had to face during his second year with the district as its top administrator.

A good school is based on strong teachers and student body. Through inservice training workshops, teachers are trained by the administration to be strong insuring strong students that can meet the challenges of life after graduation. In the Accreditation Monitoring Report of November 7, Mr. Moehnke was commended for his instructional leadership.

The main contribution that the superintendent does for Blanco ISD is to give the district a direction for the total educational program based upon school board policies.

Working with the board at meetings for the public at night on the issue of the newly proposed high school, Mr. Moehnke has spent many hours answering questions about the school and promoting the bond proposal. Though not highly attended by the community, he was able to quiet rumors and give truthful evaluations to the interested voters.

"Seeing young people have success is the most rewarding part of my job. I enjoy working with the youth and seeing them perform in both classroom and extracurricular activities. Through these experiences, they grow and mature into successful citizens."

Mr. Moehnke has enjoyed being a part of the district with students, teachers, and strong community.



For 23 years as secretary to the superintendent and tax assessor, Joy Brussel has seen the district grow and mature into an outstanding small school that is respected over the state.



As assistant secretary to the superintendent for 7 years (9 in the district), Carol Spurgin has coped with the many changes prescribed by the state.

Priority—managing efficiently

Mike Adkins' number one priority as a principal is to manage a school environment where each student receives the optimum opportunity to advance his/her educational development. "My goal is to develop and provide for planning and adapting curriculum to fit the needs of individual students. In order to develop a better classroom environment, I try to place each student in an atmosphere most conducive to learning. Monitoring and improving instructional strategies, discipline management, classroom learning environment, assessment/evaluation and providing guidance are areas that I work with directly to insure student learning."

This being his first year at Blanco Schools, Mr. Adkins had this to say, "I chose Blanco and the Blanco area to live and work because of the beautiful geographic location and because it was close to home. I have been very impressed with the staff's attitude, commitment, and professionalism towards education this year. I have been very pleased with the students' efforts towards learning, involvement in activities, and in general, the good positive student attitude that prevails around campus."

When questioned about problems he had to deal with in his job role, he stated, "Facilities, plant, and maintenance problems are always headaches." When asked, if there was one thing he would change if he could, Mr. Adkins expressed a desire to up-grade facilities to enhance educational opportunities and "reduce some of this paper work!"

"My greatest satisfaction as a principal comes from working with students and helping them to achieve their maximum potential as successful, productive, and happy members of our society."

Never get satisfied, You can always improve!

Joe Summy is now in his second year as elementary and middle school principal. Mr. Summy misses the classroom but intends to go on as long as he feels he is developing, getting satisfaction, and as long as he feels he is being effective.

Part of being effective is setting up an environment for learning where a student is able to accomplish both academic and personal achievement. This is Mr. Summy's number one goal. "If you have one without the other, a child is not going to be successful," says Mr. Summy.

With all the growth the middle school is experiencing, Mr. Summy has had to make many changes. One of the biggest was starting the middle school and trying to develop a middle school facility. Some changes Mr. Summy would like to make include moving the middle school to the old high school. "You need to have a middle school program and treat the middle school students like a special population," says Mr. Summy. "We are trying to do that now, but our facilities are so tight."

Presently, Mr. Summy keeps the student council involved in meaningful activities. "They have a responsibility to make things better; they have effected change in the building quite a lot."

Another change you can find this year is the increase in displays. "It is important for students to feel as if they are a part of something. The work is important and we recognize that."

To understand the response of students to Mr. Summy, you would have to be with him in a specific part of the building. If he is in the lower grades, you will find him the recipient of many hugs. In the upper grades, there is a show of respect on both sides. "I have a standard motto, 'Whoever walks through that door is loved unconditionally.' That doesn't mean that you don't have to discipline a child, but that love they don't have to earn. I think that concern comes over."
