The announcer recognized her as the sponsor who brought the first and second place girls last year. The sponsor deserves almost as much credit as the students themselves do. They spend many long hours working with the students, getting practice materials, and accompanying their students to practice and UIL competitions. Literary Criticism requires even more work than some of the other events; there are so many facts, stories, and poems to be found. Getting to bring this plaque home to Blanco makes up for the work done every year by Mrs. Nabors. Bringing back two in a row shows her competence as a sponsor.

Blanco's UIL Literary Team of '89 was one of the strongest ever to compete. At the district contests in Junction and Mason, we successfully defended our first place title, making Blanco number one for two years running. A strong showing at district qualified fourteen people for regionals, some in two events.

At state, Blanco didn't slow down! The big wins were two firsts made by Kay, in Spelling, and Karen, in Literary Criticism. Kay also placed fifth in Editorials. Max took eighth in Science, and Andy made fourth in Calculator.



Goal 4: The district will adopt technologies that help manage the instructional program.

Goal 5: By the fall of 1990, facilities will be in place to eliminate the deficiencies in present facilities.

Goal 6: The district will provide inservice training to facilitate professional growth.

Retaining competent personnel is one of the goals set by the school board. As Mr. Moehnke congratulated Joy Brusel and Claire Glost on retiring their 25 year service pins, he knew the district was fortunate to have such dedicated people on the staff of BISD.



For four years, BISD Superintendent Larry Moehnke has constantly striven for excellence in school life. He wants academics meaningful, extracurricular

The address by the superintendent at the beginning of inservice in August starts the school year off *JUST RIGHT*. His summer work has brought together new personnel and compliance to new guidelines set by the school board and Texas Education Agency.

Our principals make the atmosphere

Success in school is the goal of High School Principal Mike Adkins. He wants every student in BHS to be successful in attaining life's goals. A good education can start them on that road.

To help students succeed this year, Mr. Adkins instituted a mandatory tutorial period in the reg-

ular class schedule. The daily tutorial period is primarily for those students falling below the 70% mastery level in any course subject. Students who are passing all subjects have an option to attend any tutorial to receive additional help and support. The intensive "one to one" reteaching

activity between students and teachers has positively reinforced student achievement.

Improvement on the TEAMS test was set out as a goal for the '88-89 school year. He has encouraged his staff to attend workshops that will enable them to instruct students to achieve success

on the statewide test.

Mr. Adkins' personality comes through when he says, "We can always improve, but don't change for change's sake! We must have a vision of what we can become and improve ourselves constantly!"



Keeping attendance, computer records, and clerical work for high school principals has been Ruth Harvey's duty for most of her 23 years. She has seen changes and coped with them; her knowledge of former students makes her a valuable part of the office.




