




Chris has also participated in UIL for 4 years. Competing in ready writing, science, and calculator applications, he qualified for the regional level both his junior and senior year.

BHS welcomed 12 students from Germany to their new school. All the German students are stayed with BHS families during their 3-week Easter break. The exchange student families gave these 12 students a fantastic spring break—a flight across the big pond, and an exploration of American culture. Their BHS families gave them night sailing excursions.

Adjusting to a new type of school schedule was one of the most dramatic changes they experienced. In their respective high schools in the western part of Germany around Cologne, they go to school only from 8 till 1 p.m. each day. They also take 11 courses, which are not taught every day as we do here.

Adjusting to a smaller student body caused another modification. Most of their student bodies number well over 1,000 compared to BHS's 200 student high school.

One noted variation is that all of BHS's guests are academically geared. At the end of the 4th grade, their parents and the school decide whether to send them to academic or vocational schools based on grades and performance.

In Germany, a citizen cannot drive an automobile until the age of 18. The average age of these students is 16; not one is 18.

One student council found out about the visiting student program because of 5th grade teacher Norma Oran's sister, who teaches in Olney. The Olney school has had the program for quite a few years.

These students plan on taking rock quite a few paces of "jams" with these because in Germany jams average about \$90 a pair. They are surprised at our prices for flowers, because their area is near Holland, flowers cost half compared to ours.



As a show of friendship from BHS, the council gave the opposing school a 3D art football game. Our council gave native species so that the schools could place a permanent, living remembrance of BHS.



From part of the profits made from the track machine, the council bought a Christmas tree and decorations for the lunchroom to give students some "spirit" during school hours.


